## ORAL + OROPHARYNGEAL CANCER RATES ARE GROWING



**529,000+**  
new cases of oral cancer  
each year worldwide<sup>1</sup>



In 2017 in the U.S.<sup>2</sup>  
**49,750+**  
individuals **will be**  
**diagnosed** with oral or  
oropharyngeal cancer



**132** new cases of oral cancer  
diagnosed each day



**9,750** will die of  
oral cancer

## THE FACES OF ORAL CANCER ARE CHANGING

Oral, head and neck cancer among young adults is on the rise due to an increase in oral human papilloma virus (HPV), a common sexually transmitted disease<sup>5</sup>

**70%**

of oropharyngeal  
cancers may be  
associated  
with HPV<sup>6</sup>

**59%**

of U.S. adults are  
not aware that HPV  
is a risk factor for  
oral cancer<sup>7</sup>

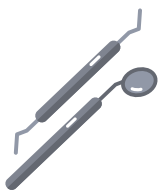

## MORE EDUCATION AND PREVENTION IS NEEDED

62% of U.S. adults know very little, or nothing at all about oral cancer<sup>10</sup>



**MORE THAN 81%**  
**OF U.S. ADULTS**

would like to be screened for oral  
cancer at every dental check-up<sup>13</sup>



**ONLY 29% OF U.S. ADULTS**  
reported that they were screened for  
oral cancer at their last dental check-up<sup>12</sup>



**ONLY 20% OF U.S. ADULTS**

say that their dental professional spoke  
with them about risk factors for oral  
cancer at their last dental check-up<sup>11</sup>



**MORE THAN 77%**  
**OF U.S. ADULTS**

want their dentist to help them learn ways  
to reduce their risk of getting oral cancer<sup>14</sup>
